Training equipment for Nurture Africa hairdressing training, Uganda

The Van Doorn Foundation supports Nurture Africa in Uganda in setting up hairdressing training by providing funds to purchase the necessary training equipment and tools. € 3.900, - is required and these funds have been made available from the Addo Kranendonk Fund.

Nurture Africa has a clinic and youth centre with about 1500 registered HIV / AIDS patients (about 50 consultations per day). The clinic provides information on family planning and primary health care to pregnant women and to mothers and their children. In addition, the centre started teaching some girls sewing and hairdressing skills. But the centre does not dispose of sufficient equipment, too little in relation to the demand, but also too little to really teach a skill, which makes the training more an occupational therapy. To truly help Nansana's youth, Nurture Africa wants to create a "best practice" vocational training in their youth centre, providing young people with professional training, and with the recently provided training equipment it can now start doing so.

Electricity bottleneck for PACER Polytechnic School, Uganda



The Van Doorn Foundation supports the improvement of the quality of education of the Pacer Community Polytechnic School by making funds available for the provision of training equipment and tools through Tools to Work. Half of the necessary funds were collected by the SMEs from Woudenberg and surroundings, the other half was made available from the Addo Kranendonk Fund. The training equipment and tools provided by Tools to Work have now partially been put in use.

During Paul's visit to the school in February, it became apparent the challenges the school faces. For example, the school uses a generator for electricity, but the fuel consumption of the generator is a big financial burden and consequently electrical equipment and tools are not yet being used. Recently, the public grid has been extended from the city of Pakwach to the school (6 km) and is now waiting for the connection to the grid and the wiring inside the school complex itself. The school also has no water, but also that problem is being addressed. We witnessed a water pipe being constructed from the State water reservoir to the school (2 km) and a water tower being built on the premises of the school itself.



Scholarships

Of all initial applications received in the first half of 2017, 20 passed the eligibility criteria. These applicants were invited to submit a final application form. In the end, 11 applications were approved, three for a secondary school education (1 boy and 2 girls) and eight for higher vocational education. From them one young woman to pursue a physiotherapy training, one voung woman a special education teacher's

training, two young men pursue a secondary school teacher's training and two young men pursue natural science education.

Up to now, 39 young people have received a scholarship, twenty young men / boys and nineteen young women / girls, 40% of whom are in lower and secondary vocational education and 60% in higher / university vocational education.

Olive Mudondo, 21-year-old young woman from Uganda

I am Olive Mudondo. I am originally from Kisozi, Kamuli district. I am a mother to a 4 year old son called Innocence. I had dropped out of school in Primary 6 and have never been able to go to secondary school. Thanks to the Van Doorn Foundation, I was able to join a two years course at St. Cecilia Kisubi Vocational Training Institute in Entebbe. They admitted me to the course Tailoring and Fashion. The past two years I have learnt many things, mainly on designing fashion and making clothes for different occasions. I am able to make fashionable dresses, nice children's clothes, and smart men's fashion. I can also make bridal dresses and traditional gomesi for women [traditional dress in Uganda]. I have learnt to maintain my sewing machine and apart from the practical things I have followed computer lessons and was trained in entrepreneurship. I have grown a lot the past two years and I am able to start earning my own living now. I hope I can look after my son

better and now that I have completed my studies and training I hope to find a job or start my own business. In June I shall receive my certificate. I want to thank the Van Doorn Foundation for enabling me to do this training and complete my studies! I cannot thank you enough for making this change in my life. Olive.

Abdulbasit Wembi, 21 years old. He started in January 2017 a three-year training for teacher in agriculture and horticulture at the University of Kampala in Uganda

I have come to the end of the first semester of my first year of study 2017. The semester ended the day I sat for my last exam which was on May 2, 2017. The semester went on smoothly from the beginning and I never had any big problem.

Lecturers have been attending to us without any failure unless he or she is having a serious problem. Vocational training for young people from slums of Mathare-Nairobi

In Mathare - one of Nairobi's largest slum areas – live approximately 200,000 people, of which about 50% are between 15 and 30 years old. The average income of the population is USD 1 per day ... and this impedes many young people to go to school, to follow a vocational education and, consequently, to find work. They turn to unwanted and / or illegal ways to provide for their living, such as crime, prostitution and drug trafficking.

The Reality Tested Youth Program (RTYP) was founded in 2004 and has, among others, set up an internship program aimed at the large group of young people in the Mathare slums. The purpose of the program is to provide them with skills that allow them to start working as self-employed entrepreneurs. From this program, internships are being sought with craftsmen in the slums where young people can learn a trade (such as hairdresser, tailor, car mechanic and electrician). In addition to this internship program, RTYP also wants to

run a number of training programs, and the Van Doorn Foundation will help them by providing funds for the purchase of training equipment (sewing machines, computers) and training tools (for welding and automotive).

The project should result in a training centre fully equipped to provide voca-



tional training to approximately 100 vulnerable young people from the Mathare slums of Nairobi. This will ensure that these young people are more likely to find employment, as a self-employed entrepreneur, and will have a greater chance of obtaining a microcredit from a financial institution as starting capital for their small businesses.

Project costs are estimated at \in 6,550 of which one part (\in 5,000) has been pledged from the Addo Kranendonk Fund and for the remainder (\in 1,550) the Van Doorn Foundation is looking for sponsors.

School furniture for Chepkorio vocational training centre in Elgeyo-Marakwet County, Kenya

Chepkorio is a town in the Elgeyo-Marakwet County, in the Rift Valley Province of Kenya with a population of about 400,000 people. The Anglican Church in Chepkorio has built a vocational training centre for the more disadvantaged young people in the county who cannot pursue an education in the 40 km further located university-city of Eldoret. Due to limited financial resources, it has taken the church a decade to build a number of classrooms, workshops, dormitories for students and accommodation for the instructors. The centre provides training to about 150 students who want to become mason, carpenter, electrician, welder and metalworker, car mechanic, tailor and hairdresser. In addition, all students receive general training in ICT, communication, life skills and entrepreneurship. The

Chepkorio vocational training centre has asked the Van Doorn Foundation to provide financial support for the purchase of tools and materials so that the students of the centre themselves can make school furniture for the centre.

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The project costs are estimated at € 3,600 for which the Van Doorn Foundation is seeking sponsors. Read more >> Chepkorio Kenia

The mission of the Van Doorn Foundation is to contribute to the fight against poverty by funding education for vulnerable and financially less fortunate youths in third-world countries, so to increase their chances to find jobs to provide for themselves and to support their families in the future.

Our target group are young people between the ages of twelve to twenty-five years, whose parents cannot or with great difficulty pay the school fees, and institutions (such as vocational training centres, technical schools and universities, training centres for disabled children) who need financial support to make education accessible and affordable for disadvantaged young people.
